Tom Neidecker has been a member of the U.S. delegation of the Swiss Council since 2009. He is responsible for the following areas: AR, AZ (Tucson area), CO, LA, NM, OK and TX.

Tom lived in the San Francisco Bay Area and Sonoma County for thirty-five years before moving to the Sonoran desert north of Tucson, Arizona. He is a citizen of Bern and the world and feels at home in the U.S. Born in Basel, he

went to boarding school in the French-speaking part of Switzerland.

After an early formative experience in a Kibbutz he returned to his home town Basel where he studied electrical engineering and - at the same time - lithography, art history and critique of visual objects at the College of Design. He worked and studied in Paris in his early twenties and received a degree in trilingual technical and scientific translation before moving to San Francisco and working for an electronic component distributor in Silicon Valley in the early eighties. In his late twenties, he incorporated and became President/CEO of Multi-Contact USA, a leading manufacturer of electric and electronic connectors and contact-interfaces.

At the age of fifty, Tom decided to live his life-long passion for books, art and artistic photography full time, and resided for four years in Lugano where Oriana, his California-born daughter graduated from the American School in Switzerland in Montagnola. She is now finishing a post-graduate degree in Interactive Technology at NYU.

Tom is working with museums on the West Coast for photography exhibitions and visiting art shows and galleries in Europe, the Americas and Asia in the pursuit of adding to his collection of art books and Classic Modern photography.

He is the president and co-founder of the Swiss-California Foundation in Santa Rosa, CA, which invites graduate students from the School of Economics in St. Gallen to spend a year visiting the San Francisco Bay Area while working at the Economic Development Board in Sonoma County.

He speaks five languages, loves skiing, sky- and scuba-diving and travels the world with Martha, a Mexican-born archaeologist, wife and partner of thirty years. They divide their time between their homes in Oro Valley, Arizona and Acapulco, Mexico.

Tom has been a member of the Petaluma Valley Rotary for over thirty years and believes that travel and immersion into different cultures are mind-expanding and life-enriching.

Oklahoma: Oklahoma City

It was a cold Monday morning in Oklahoma City! April just started and Easter was passing by. For many in the State of Oklahoma a memorable day. Not because it was Easter Monday, but because all schools were closed! Oklahoma teachers just walked out on their government. They all gathered around the Oklahoma State Capitol rallying for more education funding. A historical moment for the Okie State which will go on for another eight days. For others, it was the start of the Oklahoma Consular Summit. Governor Mary Fallin welcomed diplomatic representatives from 10 countries to Oklahoma for a two-day Consular Summit on economic development opportunities. Hosted by the Oklahoma Governor's International Team and sponsored by the Oklahoma Business Roundtable, the representatives met with the Governor at the Governor's mansion. The Swiss Consul General Peter Zimmerli was among the visitors, participating in several other events that day. He is representing Switzerland's interests in Atlanta providing services to eleven states from North Carolina to Florida and from Texas to Tennessee. His jurisdiction naturally includes Oklahoma which gave him the opportunity to also visit with the local Honorary Consul Rico Buchli. In the last 15 years, Oklahoma became a rising State generating a lot of economic interest. Today, Swiss companies create around 5000 jobs in Oklahoma and are the 4th largest employer of foreign affiliates. Oklahoma exports around \$10 M of goods to Switzerland and imports \$70 M of goods from Switzerland. There are nearly 20 Swiss companies located in Oklahoma. More astonishing, there are about 6,000 Oklahoma residents of Swiss descent. Don't be surprised to run into a Swiss in Oklahoma!

After an informative two-day Summit, Consul General Zimmerli extended his stay to learn more about Oklahoma. He visited several historic, cultural, and outdoor attractions, including the Oklahoma City National Memorial & Museum, the Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum, the Centennial Land Run Monument, and of course had a short encounter with part of the legendary Route 66. In addition, the CG also traveled to Stillwater to visit with Randy Kluver, the Dean of the School of Global Studies and Partnerships at Oklahoma State University. Not only learning about "Pistol Pete" and touring the Boone Pickens Stadium through the Athletics department, his OSU visit also covered the Spears School of Business and the Wes Watkins Center learning more about their programs.

Of course, a visit to the Oklahoma Swiss Club in Tulsa was part of his itinerary which is a must for every Swiss Representative visiting Oklahoma. But a courtesy visit with the Tulsa Mayor G.T. Bynum was first on the program, exchanging pleasantries followed by a round of interesting remarks about upcoming economic developments in Tulsa and the advantages of the Swiss Apprenticeship Model applied to Oklahoma. At last, hosted by the Siegenthaler family at their lovely home in Broken Arrow, the Oklahoma Swiss greeted their new Consul General with great excitement. Peter Zimmerli responded with a toast, thanking the guests for attending and providing such a delightful reception. A dinner on the 31st floor of "The Summit Club" with panoramic view to the Arkansas River to the west and the Osage Hills to the north concluded his Oklahoma visit.

In March of 2018, Chicago and Lucerne came together to celebrate their 20th Anniversary as Sister Cities with special events held around the city of Chicago.

20 years ago, Chicago and Lucerne signed the official sister city agreement that launched the beginning of years of collaborations between both cities. Fast forward to March 15 when Chicago Sister Cities International celebrated the 20th anniversary with Lucerne, along with those of Milan, Italy, and Osaka, Japan, (45 years) and Birmingham, UK, and Vilnius, Lithuania, (25 years), by hosting their Celebrating Citizen Diplomacy Reception at the Chicago Cultural Center.

Over 300 guests enjoyed international food and drink highlighting various of Chicago's 28 international sister cities and heard remarks from Chicago's Mayor Rahm Emanuel about the importance of the

work citizen diplomats do to help elevate Chicago's global profile. In addition, Mayor Emanuel presented the Consuls General and sister city committee chairs of the five sister cities celebrating anniversaries with resolutions passed by Chicago City Council in honor of their respective anniversaries. A special presentation of videos created by the same five sister cities were shown, where each city's mayor sent greetings to the people of Chicago in honor of the anniversaries. The audience thoroughly enjoyed Lucerne Mayor Züsli's video greeting, which was diplomatic and fun at the same time.

The highlight of the evening was when the famous carnival band from Lucerne, the Noggeler Guuggenmusig Luzern, performed for the guests in full costume. The Noggeler were invited by Chicago Sister Cities International to perform because 20 years ago, they performed at the official signing of the sister city agreement between Chicago and Lucerne.

Chicago continued to enjoy performances by Lucerne's Noggeler



Band throughout the St. Patrick's Day weekend, as they were invited to play all over the City of Chicago. On Friday, March 16th, they performed for a sold-out crowd of 700 people at the Hofbräuhaus in Rosemont, dancing to, and reveling in the music of the Noggeler. So many people approached them asking about their costumes, music, Lucerne and Switzerland. We are sure to get many tourists traveling to Lucerne after this event!

On Saturday, March 17th, the Noggeler were invited for the second time to perform and march as the official guests of the St. Patrick's Day Parade Committee as the only international band in the St. Patrick's Day Parade. They brought Switzerland to Chicago with their festive scarves highlighting both cities, their costumes, and fabulous music. They were asked to perform in front of the live TV cameras and played for over three minutes!

Parade attendance was listed at two million spectators – the largest in the history of the parade. After the parade people flocked to the Park Grill Restaurant in Millennium Park under the famous Cloud Gate sculpture, also known as "The Bean," to continue listening to the band play during the afternoon.

On their last evening in Chicago, the Noggeler were asked to play in front of the United Center Stadium before the start of the Chicago Blackhawks professional hockey game on March 18th. They entertained the crowd, took pictures with people, and went inside to cheer on the Blackhawks.

During their time in Chicago, the Noggeler Guuggenmusig Luzern represented Lucerne in the highest regard, not only with their music and heritage, but with their ability to reach out to the Chicago people and make friends with their sister city. Until next time!
